1. A Visit to Orphanage

Recently, I visited an orphanage run by the Missionaries of Charity. It was indeed a pleasure to be greeted by the smiling faces of innocent children. Walking around was a pleasant experience as my expectations of a dusty and gloomy place was replaced by the reality of a vibrant, heart-warming and welcoming environment. I was moved by the sight of children between the ages of one and five years living in the orphanage. The children smiled with sparkling and curious eyes as we walked around. Most of the children were abandoned by unwed mothers and poor parents. The orphanage looked after the children, fed them well and dressed them cleanly. It had airy rooms and clean surroundings. I was greatly touched by the dedication and commitment of sisters and nuns. Some generous people also donated money to the orphanage every month. It was a day spent between fun and games and towards the end of my visit I parted with the promise to return soon.

2. Sachin Tendulkar

Sachin Tendulkar is considered one of the greatest batsmen in the history of cricket. He was born on 24th April 1973 in Bombay (now Mumbai). He was introduced to cricket at age of 11. He got early training by Ramakant Achrekar during his school days at Sharadashram Vidyamandir. Sachin Tendulkar was just 16 when he became India's youngest Test cricketer. He also got early fame when he made 664 runs partnership with Vinod Kambli in Lord Harris Shield inter-school competition. In 2005, he became the first cricketer to score 35 centuries (100 runs in a single inning) in Test play. In 2008, he reached another major milestone by surpassing Brian Lara's mark of 11,953 Test runs. Tendulkar took home the World Cup with his team in 2011 and wrapped up his record-breaking career in 2013. He holds the record for the highest tally of runs in Test matches as well as One Day International (ODI) matches.

3. Elections Held in the City

A municipal corporation administers urban areas with a population of more than one million. At first, the parties run an election campaign that publicises the candidate by coming in contact with voters, address election meetings, deliver speeches and mobilise their supporters. The party's propaganda is

displayed to the public through such campaigns. Often charges are inferred on opposition candidates who are involved in criminal activities.

Apart from this, posters are an essential part of campaigns. These can keep the campaigns relevant and promote the respective candidate. On the polling day, adult voters get their chance to choose their choice of representative in election booths. Nowadays, they use EVM (electronic voting machines) where voters press a button on their choice of party symbol. Each voter needs a valid voter ID that is checked at the entrance. Arrangements at the polling booths are always good. The ballot boxes are sealed after the polling ends in the presence of the agents of the respective candidates. Then they are sent to the District Head Quarters for counting. Once the counting is over, the results are declared.

4. International Trade Fair

An International Trade Fair was held at PragatiMaidan, in Delhi in the month of November last year. I visited this fair along with my cousins. Some big industrial companies of the world participated in the fair. Huge, attractive stalls were put up in the field. The fair lasted for one week. From electronics gadgets to each and every home appliance, the stall was filled with latest models of electronic goods. It was organised to showcase and demonstrate the latest products and services of the company. Handicraft section was the one that caught my attention. Though, 2019 saw a boom in the purchase of both smartphones and computers, according to the chart. Therefore, we could analyse from the chart that after 2017, the residents of Rishunagar preferred smartphones over computers in their purchase of digital devices.
- 2. The given table shows the total production of different types of cars by different manufacturing companies from the year 2015 to 2020. According to the table, the production of these five cars increased over the years except for the Hyundai i10. In 2015, the number of Hyundai i10 car produced was 140,000 which dipped to 120,000 in the year 2016, 130,000 in 2017 and 135,000 in 2018. Its demand steadily increased in the year 2019. Typewrite: The evolution of the typewriter over the years has played an on-going part of the history of the human need to communicate with others. The invention of the typewriter was brought about in part by combining the need for both speed of communication and for the binding of reading and writing. After many years of thought a machine emerged that would revolutionize the work of a writer that would have normally been done by hand.

The first typewriter was invented by Christopher Latham Sholes, and was marketed by the Remington Arms Company in 1873. The process of the type bars in the earliest typewriters was labelled slow, and tended to jam frequently. To fix this problem, Mr Sholes obtained a list of the most common letters used in the English language, he rearranged his keyboard from a alphabetic arrangement to one in which the most common pairs of letters were spread far apart on the keyboard. Because of the "hunt and peck" method used by typist at the time, Sholes's arrangement increased the time it took for the typist to hit the keys for common two letter combinations to ensure that each type bar had time to fall back and be out of the way before the next one came up to type the next letter. It was noted that Sholes's never expected that typing would ever be faster than handwriting, which back then was normally around 20 words per minute (WPM) or less.

In 1878, the ten finger typing method began to be used. Promoted by a woman namedL. V. Longley, who was the head of a Cincinnati school for stenographers, started to replace the hunt and peck method. Later, Frank E. McGurrin, a federal court clerk, taught himself to touch-type without looking at the keys.

Ball Pen:A ballpoint pen is a writing instrument with a tip that is continuously supplied with ink. The pen consists of a metal ball seated in a socket below an ink reservoir (the chamber or tube that holds a supply of ink). The ink reservoir is called an ink cartridge. When applied to a writing surface, the ball rotates and is bathed with just enough ink for smooth writing. The ballpoint pen was developed as a solution to the problems of using a fountain pen for writing. Fountain pens need constant refilling with ink. The ink may leak or clog up the pen. The part that is used for writing is exposed, while the rest stays inside the pen. When the pen tip is applied to a writing surface, the ball rolls transferring ink from the ink reservoir to the writing surface. Another advantage of the ballpoint pen is that its ink is quick-drying. In 1941 Bíró brothers and a their friend, Juan Jorge Meyne fled to Argentina and opened their Bíró

Pens of Argentina - factory that made ballpoint pens and sold them in Argentina as "Birome".
